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Local perspective

Our vision is to be amongst the best

The Trust has four hospital sites. Three of these, the Lister, new QEII and Hertford County provide a large acute secondary care service to a population of 600,000. In addition there is a sub-regional Renal Unit which provides Renal Services to 1.4 million people in Hertfordshire, Bedfordshire and Essex.

The Trust also manages the internationally recognised Mount Vernon Cancer Centre which provides a tertiary service for a population of over 2,000,000.



The Trust has a long history of being research active with particular strengths in Cancer, Renal, Cardiovascular Disease and Diabetes.

The research activity at the Trust is a mixture of studies which staff have gained through external funding via grants, studies that are commerciallyfunded and also participation of studies funded via national and local charities.

The Trust is a member of the **National Institute for Health Research**, fully supports the Health Research Authority and is committed to fully implementing the UK Policy Framework for Health and Social Care Research.

The above strategy was developed through extensive consultation and our web-based surveys received a total 499 responses and over 800 written comments. The research strategy was developed from a strong patient mandate, details given below.

- 90% agreed The Trust's vision is 'to be amongst the best' - incorporating research into our core business purpose and objectives and into routine patient care is an important part of this.
- 94% agreed We should engage with patients and aspire to provide opportunities for all patients to participate in research.
- 88% agreed We should introduce a practical way
 of taking 'consent to contact' so we can develop a
 database of patients who would like to be involved
 in future research studies.
- 95% agreed For our research strategy to succeed we need to recognise that we are part of a wider system of healthcare, academia and industry and that we have to work together to deliver research for patient benefit.

Research Participant survey 2016/17

We are grateful to the 100 patients who gave us their views on what it is like to take part in research. When asked "Overall, how would you rate your experience of taking part in research on a scale of 1 to 10 – with 1 being very poor and 10 excellent?" 69 responded with a score of 10 as excellent, 29 responded with a score of 9 and the remainder responded with 7 or more.
